Survey Methodology

Survey Methodology


- Random Digit Dialing (RDD) Telephone Survey methodology provides scientific validity
 - Population estimate
 - Produces the “purest” random sample
- (954) 435 - _____
- RDD Telephone Survey(300 surveys)
- List Telephone Survey (900 surveys)
- Cell Phone Households with non-local area codes with DJNs based on billing zip codes
- 1,200interviews
- Response Rate (AAPOR RR₃) is 39%and cooperation rate is 83%
- Weighting factors are used to combine the samples
- Interviews averaged about 22 minutes each
- Phones were dialed 121,477 times
- Interviewing April to June 2016

Comparison Bar Chart




- Compare with up to about 55 other Jewish communities with RDD studies since 1993

- Particularly Instructive Comparisons: Atlanta, Houston, Las Vegas, Miami, South Palm Beach, West Palm Beach



of whom 149,000 persons are Jewish




Percentage of Households in the Community Who Are Jewish Households (Jewish Households)







OF JEWISH HOUSEHOLDS**




Jewish Households 1997-2016





Locally Born (Adults in Jewish Households)




Foreign Born (Adults in Jewish Households)




Number of Hispanic Jewish Adults




Country From Which Hispanic Jewish Adults Come








Number of Israeli Jewish Adults




Someone in Household Considers Themselves to Be LGBT (Jewish Households)




Migration of Full-Year Households

- **Average Annual In-Migration**
 - 900 full-year households moved in each year during the past five years
- **Projected Average Annual Out-Migration**
 - 400 full-year households definitely moving out of Broward each year during the next three years
 - 1,300 full-year households probably moving out of Broward each year during the next three years
- **Projected Change**
 - the Jewish population should continue to decrease in the next few years as a result of migration






Changes in Age of Children Over Time






Age Distribution by Geographic Area








Household Structure

(Jewish Households)




Households with Children Age 0-17 at Home

Household Structure by Jewish Identification








Household Income of Households with Children




Changes in Jewish Identification, 1997-2016


















Being Jewish Is Mainly a Matter of:




















Intermarriage (Couples Intermarriage Rate)




Types of Marriage by Age of Head of Household



translates to


13% Individual Inter-marriage Rate








Current Synagogue Membership of Households with Children











(Born or Raised Jewish Adults)






Correlation with Adult Jewish Behaviors








Market Share for Jewish Day School

Ever Attended Formal Jewish Education














Trips to Israel by Jewish Teenagers

(Households with Jewish Teenagers Age 13-17)




Emotional Attachment to Israel


Extremely/Very Emotionally Attached to Israel








Personally Experienced Anti-Semitism in Local Community in the Past Year


Personally Experienced Anti-Semitism in Broward in the Past Year


Households in Which a Jewish Child Age 6-17 Experienced Anti-Semitism in the Local Community in the Past Year



Perceive a Great Deal/Moderate Amount of Anti-Semitism in Local Community


